S.A.L.T. :

S.A.L.T. is a volunteer, community-based organization designed to meet the public safety concerns of seniors in Halton Region. It is a police advisory council and an action committee.

While S.A.L.T. does not focus on police investigations, community concerns can be communicated to the committee for review and/or response.

S.A.L.T. members are largely seniors living in the community. Those who are not seniors but who have an interest in their safety and security are welcome.

S.A.L.T. Objectives:

- Improve the quality of life for Halton's elderly
- Reduce criminal victimization of seniors
- Address the concerns of the elderly; alleviate unwarranted fears
- Enhance delivery of police services to the seniors community
- Increase police sensitivity to seniors' issues and challenges
- Promote crime prevention and victim assistance programs
- Increase seniors' involvement in the planning and execution of initiatives to meet their needs
- Promote greater community participation in implementing solutions
